MONICA AMIRANTE is **President of the Surveillance Court of Salerno** since 2018. Former Surveillance Magistrate of Naples, she carried out judicial functions as Magistrate of Santa Maria Capua Vetere and Naples and then at the Court of Naples. In 1996 she was appointed **member of the Equal Opportunities Commission of the Superior Council of the Judiciary**; in 2017 she was appointed by the Commission of the Superior Council as a **member of the Joint Commission for the study of the problems of the Surveillance Magistracy and criminal execution**. In 2014, she took part in the Commission of the Ministry of Justice for the elaboration of proposals on the revision of the criminal

sanctioning system. During her experience as a criminal judge, she has had the opportunity to deepen and pronounce on delicate issues in the field of organized crime, including the "Camorra", as well as associations aimed at smuggling and clandestine abortions, but also, in the filed of bankruptcy and financial crimes. The experience gained has been particularly useful in the field of sentence enforcement, especially in the exercise of the functions of President of the Surveillance Court.

She has been a **speaker at numerous conferences and scientific initiatives**, as well as a **lecturer** at courses organized by the Higher School of the Judiciary, especially in the field of surveillance, at the "Scuola Bruniana" in Nola and at the Penitentiary Police School in Portici.
