She graduated from the Department of Political Science and Public Administration at the University of Athens and holds a PhD in International Relations from the University of Warwick (UK) where she studied as an A. Onassis Scholar. She has been Visiting Research Fellow at the Hellenic Observatory (LSE, 2018), Visiting Professor at the European Studies Center, University of Pittsburgh (2016), Policy Scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars (Southeast Europe Project), Washington D.C. (2010). She

taught at the Department of Mediterranean Studies, University of the Aegean (Rhodes, 2007- 2019) and worked as the **Director of Studies and Research at the International Center for Black Sea Studies** – ICBSS (Athens, 2005-2009) and in the Economic Affairs Committee of the Parliamentary Assembly of Black Sea Economic Cooperation (Istanbul, 2000-2004). She was also **member of the Scientific Staff of Jean Monnet European Center of Excellence of the University of Athens**. Currently, Professor Manoli is an Associate Editor of the Journal Southeast European and Black Sea Studies (Routledge/Taylor and Francis) and an Associate Researcher at the Hellenic Foundation for European and Foreign Policy. She was also **member of Scientific Staff of Jean Monnet European Center of Excellence of the University of Athens**.
